Garden Photography: Seeing the Picture

This garden photography workshop is not as much about the technical nuts and bolts of photography but instead emphasizes "seeing" the picture. Because if you can't "see" a picture, that is, recognize the elements of a strong composition and portray your subject in a visually pleasing way, then it really doesn't matter how fancy your equipment may be—you're simply not going to take a good picture. Steve Silk will talk about composition, lighting, vantage point and color. And he'll tell us about taking phone pix—fun apps to try and techniques to make the most of the simplest cameras out there.





Steve Silk became interested in plants more than 30 years ago, during extended travels in tropical South America and Southeast Asia. Some of the tropical plants seen during his journeys, along with hundreds of other plants from all parts of the world, now grow in his ever-expanding Farmington, Connecticut garden. After 15 years as an award-winning photographer and travel writer at the *Hartford Courant*, Steve moved to *Fine Gardening* magazine, where he was Managing Editor and later spent 10 years as a Contributing Editor. He now spends most of his time writing about, photographing, and re-inventing his own back yard. His



photography has garnered two Garden Writers of America awards for best portfolio. He collaborated with Sydney Eddison on *Gardens to Go* as well as *The Gardener's Palette: Creating with Color in the Garden*. Steve has appeared several times on HGTV's "Gardening by the Yard." He is a past President of the Connecticut Hardy Plant Society and of the Connecticut Horticultural Society. He often serves as a Photography Judge for FGCCT Photography exhibits in major flower shows.

Stamford Neighborhood Grant Program

Janet McCabe submitted an application for funds from the Stamford Neighborhood Grant Program and should hear if we won in early April. The request is for a \$4K grant to make a major improvement to the Welcome Garden; the goal is to replace the wooden fence and existing shrubs/plantings. The fence is the cornerstone of the garden. The 18-year old fence has outlived the normal life of a wooden fence by eight years. We plan to replace the fence with a durable PVC product with a similar design and size. We also plan to replace existing tired shrubs with an eye towards improving seasonal views of the garden.
